Texture modified foods, in particular pureed diets; have been implicated in the high prevalence of inadequate nutritional intake in aged care residents. Adding Shape It to purees allows foods to be moulded or shaped to a three-dimensional form that either resembles the original food, or is in a shape that adds interest and visual appeal to the plate.

This gives both in-home carers and residential aged care facilities more options in providing meaningful meal and social opportunities for their patients, according to Flavour Creations Founder and Managing Director, Bernadette Eriksen.

"We've evolved to become a nation of foodies – we understand and expect variety, flavour and the dining experience", said Eriksen.

"While the way in which we consume our meals may need to evolve over time, our expectations and desires around enjoying our meals do not."

"For many people with dementia, being able to choose what they want to eat when they want it is far preferable to being fed by someone else", said Eriksen.

"Our goal with Shape It is to restore dignity and offer consumers greater control over their mealtimes, which in turn can enhance self-esteem, social engagement and ultimately help improve food intake and nutritional health".

Dysphagia Fact Sheet

- Dysphagia is the medical term for difficulty or discomfort in swallowing¹
- Dysphagia can present itself at any stage in life including babies born prematurely, patients with heart defects, children with abnormalities, adults who have had a stroke or those with Parkinson's disease, motor neuron disease, dementia, or cancer of the head and neck can experience swallowing problems
- A swallowing disorder may affect 15-30% of people aged 65+ living in the community²
- Some of the major challenges Dysphagia patients face include dehydration and malnutrition
- Dehydration and malnutrition are rife nationally in hospitals and residential age care with studies having reported the rate of malnutrition among residents in residential care homes can be as high as 70%
- Humans swallow at least 900 times a day: around three times an hour during sleep, once per minute whilst awake and even more during meals¹
- More than 1 million Australians have difficulty swallowing
- One in 17 people will develop some form of dysphagia in their lifetime
